## “Orangeries and management orangery plants in Historic Gardens”

<b>Topics:</b>	<p>Orangeries can be considered as a kind of symbiosis between plants and garden architecture. Citrus plants and other plants would not be able to survive in our climate without the protection delivered by the orangeries. Without these plants, orangeries, which are important features in some of our historic gardens, would be meaningless and not even exist.</p> <p>The exchange of knowledge, about the genesis, preservation and development of the orangery buildings and related outdoor spaces and about the seasonal care and maintenance of these plant stocks are important.</p> <p>The webinar aims at providing insights into this wide range of topics. After the introductions, the first presentation will summarize the history and current trends of citrus collections and inform us about a successful event to raise public awareness for citrus plants and orangeries. Our next speaker will talk about the changing roles and importance of orangeries in historic gardens in the region of Westphalia.</p> <p>Two speakers will then present the different aspects of caring for citrus plants, e.g. soil mixture, potting, pruning and the use of orangeries during the cold season. They will share their knowledge gained by working with some of the most important collections and stunning orangeries in Belgium and the Netherlands.</p> <p>In a joint presentation two speakers from our CSGC partner Gunnebo in Sweden will inform us how they built a “traditional” orangery over the last few years.</p>
