DAY 1, Tuesday, 5th September:

09:00 - 09:30

1: Guided tour / Introduction

We will start the day in the park of Schloss Dyck with a short introduction into the history of the site, some recent developments and the new climate adaptation project. This will be done by Dyck's garden manager Berthold Holzhöfer and project manager Tamara Kunkel.

2. Reinforcement and revitalisation

We show when and how we vitalize the sensitive tree population. This includes a number of soil improvement measures, in particular Mycorrhiza fungus vaccinations, irrigation, fertilization. *Jürgen Kutscheidt (Büro Dr. Jürgen Kutscheidt)*

3. Cont. Guided tour / Mapping

The continuation of the tour will show the historical intentions and development of the tree population, in particular the negative effects of climate change so far (e.g. loss of trees). We will show how we use a modern system of digital recording of the tree population in the park since more than 20 years. Today, this is done with very modern technologies, including flying over with drones to evaluate the vitality of the tree population. At Dyck this supports the replanting with climate-adapted tree species. Experiences with these measures will be shared and the participants will be invited to discuss this as well as Dyck's activities to become a climate neutral site by 2026.

4. Tree inspection

More into detail than the mapping, we want to show how we examine the population of individual old and damaged trees. Which methods, devices and techniques are used? These include tree

tomography with the ARBOTOM® and root diagnosis with the ARBORADIX® as well as drilling resistance measurements with the RESISTOGRAPH®.

We will learn how a thorough visual analysis of a tree helps to understand its condition and difficulties and is a necessity for practical tree maintenance and cutting. Practical activities shown here include climbing techniques, cutting techniques or the installation of ropes for static protection. *Jürgen Unger (EICHHORNBAUMPFLEGE)*

6. Plantings under trees – Cover your soils!

Underplanting with shrubs, perennials and other plants can help to improve the site conditions. The presentation will inform about the selection and number of key plants as well as about the advantages and possible disadvantages of underplanting etc.

The Schloss Benrath Foundation had participated in the founding of the "Initiative Alliance Historic Gardens in Climate Change". A federal funding of 3 million Euro is now used to renovate the rainwater retention basin (also underneath the buildings), a historical system for rainwater reclamation and use in dry phases in spring and summer. In the historic park we will be informed about their measures to care for trees and other key elements.

We will visit the historic inner-city park "Hofgarten" and neighbouring new urban structures and features.
